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## Learn what your pet wants you to know at workshop

Vail Symposium holds workshop today in Eagle with pet psychics

Our dog Hani doesn't usually bark, unless a friend walks into our house — and she's scared of big dogs. For the last five years, we casually blamed it on being a pandemic puppy and not meeting many new people and dogs for a couple of years.

But, as it turns out, Hani had unresolved issues. She felt grief when she was separated from her siblings at 10 weeks old. Seven months later, she lost her sister, a fluffy American Eskimo she would cuddle up with, and over the summer, she lost her "uncle," my parents' dog.

When international pet psychics Anne Salisbury and Greg Meyerhoff read her energy, Meyerhoff said Hani was leaking energy out of her head and that she didn't feel grounded — in other words, she was out of her body a bit.

"When you're not grounded, it's hard to focus," Salisbury said. Meyerhoff added that it also affects your confidence.

He worked on her energetically to bring her back into her heart, release fear of abandonment and reduce the energy leak so she can keep it for herself. Afterward, Salisbury said she has more energy and feels good about being alive, instead of scared of what's going to happen next.

They also worked with a minor ear infection she's had and asked if I have ear problems. As it turns out, our pets often take on our problems. So naturally, when people are open, the session also highly benefits them. Hani and I both have some discomfort in our right ear, and our whole family can benefit from opening our hearts more after five stressful years, beginning with COVID-19, so Salisbury and Meyerhoff gave us specific practices to help all of us.

While some people don't believe in psychics, my dog immediately responded when Salisbury said her name — she took one of the biggest, fullest breaths I've seen her take.

Other people believe in psychic ability but consult psychics to deal with a problem solely with their pet. That can range from behavior to finding a missing pet to talking with pets who have died. But, as it turns out, we're all connected and affected by our loved one's illnesses and struggles, so the psychics address pet owners' issues, if they're open to it. The psychic couple — who previously lived in Summit County and volunteered doing readings and healings at the animal shelter — has been doing animal readings for 25 years and also provides readings and energy healing for people, including business owners who want to uplevel.

Beach began communicating with animals after receiving a reading on her cat. She was skeptical, but soon heard the psychic tell Beach details she couldn't possibly know about her cat. So, Beach studied with her and others to develop her own abilities.

When she looked into Hani's eyes, she immediately asked who recently passed. That turned out to be her furry "uncle" and buddy: my parent's dog. Beach, like Salisbury and Meyerhoff, also talks about sending pictures to pets to communicate.

"She definitely picks up and understands death because she's been exposed to the passing of these dogs. What I'm hearing from Hani is she could do therapy work. She is showing me how she could work with the elderly," Beach said, adding she likes the mellow energy of older people and dogs, because her calm energy matches them. "She's a healer herself, and she brings peace and comfort to people and pets."

Hani also told Beach that I work too much, and she would like breaks, like walking, during the day, which, of course, would be helpful for me, too. Just as Salisbury noted: "We're like a team supporting each other. We are all in the relationship, so if you have one person having an issue, it affects everybody. The best results come from everybody getting on board and everybody pitching in ... because the two of you are able to do a lot more than just one of you."

Beach also said that pets alert us to our own problems. For example, a skittish dog may indicate anxiety in owners; then it's up to the owners to work with their own issues. Just like the teamwork Salisbury pointed out, Hani and I can work as a team to be of service to others if I train her to be a therapy dog.

"It's kind of like an alert system, but it's
